

CHAPTER VI

CLOSING

This chapter contains the conclusions obtained based on the results of the research that has been conducted, and suggestions for further research.

6.1 Conclusion

The conclusions obtained based on the results of the research that has been conducted are as follows:

1. Identification and analysis of potential haram materials that have been carried out at one of the HCCP stages resulted in 14 critical points of product haramness found in the process of purchasing raw materials from suppliers who do not yet have halal certificates, warehouse facilities for storing raw materials, the production process and checking of finished products at the point of sale, and the process of distributing finished products to customers.
2. Potential haram materials found include pork fat, feces, pork gelatin, pork bristles, and pork oil originating from facilities, processes, and tools and materials used during production activities.
3. Control of critical points of prohibition, in order to implement the halal value chain in Minang Kayo, the design of raw material acceptance forms, facility cleanliness forms, finished product delivery forms, halal equipment status forms, critical points of prohibition records, and halal value chain evaluation checksheets were carried out.
4. Halal Value Chain Evaluation in the leather craft production process in Minang Kayo is carried out by filling out four forms that have been designed, where the forms are filled out by the relevant employees, referring to the critical points of prohibition that have also been designed.
5. Based on the halal value chain evaluation conducted, the results showed that one of the four forms were rejected, namely the raw material receipt form, this was because the raw materials received from the supplier did not yet have a halal certificate.

6. Efforts that Minang Kayo can make to fully implement the Halal Value Chain are by requesting information on halal products from raw material suppliers which are proven by halal certificates, or alternatively, by looking for other raw material suppliers who already have halal product certificates.

6.2 Suggestion

For future research, an analysis of the halal value chain can be conducted on the leather tanning process at the leather processing unit, where Minang Kayo currently obtains its tanned leathers supplies. This research could help the leather processing unit obtain halal certification for tanned leather processing, while also assisting Minang Kayo in securing suppliers of halal-certified tanned leather.
