5.1 Conclusion

Tally is always adjusting herself to meet other people's expectations rather than embracing her true identity. At the end of the story, her decision to undergo the Pretty surgery as part of an experiment to test a cure is an example of the superego leading her to self-sacrifice in order to protect others and as a responsibility of her mistake. Tally's character demonstrates how the superego becomes stronger when a person

takes responsibility for their actions and follows their own sense of morality.

The writer conclude that Tally equates beauty with acceptance and happiness because her id's desire for pleasure, her ego need validation, and her superego moral struggle.
