CHAPTER IV

CONCLUSION

In this research, the writer found Tense, Aspect and modal used in the selected news by the journalist of Bleacher Report news. Comrie's (1986) theory is used to analyze the types of tenses. Meanwhile, Comrie's (1976) and Cann's (1993) theories are applied to analyze the kind of aspect. Quirk's (1980) and Kreidler's (1998) theories are applied to analyze the type of modal.

The most present tenses used in the text are simple present tense with 24 data and 28.24 %. The second most used present tense is present perfect tense in exclamations 15.29% of 13 data. The third is present progressive Tense 8.23% of 7 data and last is present perfect continuous tense 4.71% of 4 data. Meanwhile, past tense also divides into four categories. They are simple past tense, past progressive tense, past perfect, and past perfect continuous tense. Simple past tense is the most past tense used in this research, with percentage 32.94% of 28 data. The second is past progressive 5.88% of 5 data. The third is past perfect 3.53% with 3 data and the last is past perfect continuous tense 1.18% with 1 data. Overall, simple past tense becomes the most used tense used in this research.

The most used aspect found in this research is simple aspect with percentage 61.16% with 52 data. The second is perfective Aspect 24.70% with 21 data and the less used is progressive Aspect 14.14% with 12 data. The simple aspect is the most

aspect found in this research because the journalist of the Bleacher Report news delivers the news by not including when an action begins and ends.

The most ordinary found is *have* with 25 data and 29.41% in percentage. The second most used is ordinary *be* 24.71% with 21 data and the last is *do* 2.35% of 2 data found. Meanwhile, auxiliary separates into two categories which are deontic and epistemic. Deontic is more found in this research with 5 data and 5.88% in percentage. Epistemic found in 2 data with 2.36%. The rest of the datum did not use any modal form, as seen in 30 data out of 85. The ordinary *have* is the most modal used by the journalist because most of the subjects in the text are owns their compliment or object.
