

## CHAPTER IV

### CONCLUSION AND SUGGESTION

#### 4.1 Conclusion

Based on the analysis of 48 data in the previous chapter, it is concluded that there are many linguistic habits of using expressive speech acts by *Bretman Rock* in his conversation in *Clevver News* on *Youtube*. The types of expressive acts found are (1) Agreement, (2) Disagreement, (3) Volition, (4) Thanking, (6) Non- directed complaints in exclamation, (7) Expressing sorrow, (8) Greetings.

Agreement is the most dominant expressive type (33,3%), because it is commonly found in *Bretman Rock* utterances. In the second-order is disagreement utterances (20,8%), then non-directed complaints in exclamation in the third position (16,6%), then thanking utterances in the fourth (12,5%), then volition and expressing sorrow (6,25%), and type of expressive with the lowest percentage is greeting (4,16%). With the result that, agreement is the most dominant of expressive types shown by *Bretman Rock*.

It can be concluded that from the language style device of expressive speech acts which he commonly used, *Bretman Rock* has a good personality and a pleasant person when interviewed. He is a very open and confident person. During the interview, *Bretman* showed his positive attitude. *Bretman* conducted the interview in a relaxed and fun way. Some rumors which are a little offensive don't make *Bretman* get offended, with a little surprise he calmly answers questions from the hosts of *Clever News*. *Bretman* can survive and protect himself from being a fake person. In this analysis, it can be concluded *Bretman* is a very relaxed person

and does not get offended easily. As an artist and influencer, Bretmant is not arrogant and very cooperative when interviewed.

#### **4.2 Suggestion**

Having done the analysis, there is a limitation of this research. This research still has deficiencies in the form of implementing the type of expressive speech act. Hence, the next researcher can minimize the limitation. This research only analyzes the types and expressive speech acts on the speaker's utterance. However, there are some of the interlocutor's responses that can also be analyzed by the next researcher.
